HOSPITAL STAY Checklist

Going to the hospital can be stressful, but being prepared helps you feel more in control.

QUESTIONS BEFORE YOU GO

	Do I understand why I'm going to the hospital and what to expect before, during, and after?
	Have I asked my doctor about all my options, including second opinions or different hospitals?
	Am I bringing someone with me to ask questions or take notes during appointments?
	Have I told my doctor about all my health conditions, past surgeries, and allergies? Is this documented?
	Have I made a complete list of medications, including over the counter, vitamins, and supplements?
	Have I asked my insurance if this hospital and provider are covered?
	EMOTIONAL PREPAREDNESS
	Have I told someone I trust how I'm feeling about the hospital
	stay — and asked them to check in on me? Do I have a small comfort item with me?
	Have I written down any questions or worries I want to bring up with my doctor or care team?
	PLANNING AHEAD
	Have I arranged for transportation home?
	Have I arranged for time off work, and help with kids, pets, or plants?
\bigcirc	Have I asked whether I'll need rehab or home health care after my stay?
	Does the hospital have a copy of my advance directive, or do I need to complete one?



PACKING LIST

A little planning goes a long way – not just in your care, but in your peace of mind.

CLOTHING & COMFORT

	Soft, loose-fitting pajamas, comfortable clothes, or a robe
	Non-slip socks or slippers
	A cozy blanket and pillow
	A comforting item: photo, stuffed animal, or small keepsake
	Entertainment: books, headphones, journal, puzzles, phone charger
	A sleep mask or earplugs for rest
	TOILETRIES
	Toothbrush, toothpaste, hairbrush, deodorant, lip balm, lotion
	Extra: face wipes, hand sanitizer, glasses/contacts, feminine hygiene products (if needed), etc.
	MEDICAL & FINANCIAL
	Full list of medications you take & bottles
	Medical history and allergy list
	Insurance cards, photo ID, credit/debit card
	Advance directive (if you have one)
	Emergency Contact List
	Any required pre-approval letters or referrals
\bigcap	Hospital Admission forms

What to Leave at Home: Valuables, large amounts of cash, jewelry, strong perfumes/scented lotions, and medications not approved by hospital staff (always check first).



DURING & AFTER YOUR STAY

A hospital stay can feel overwhelming - but you have the power to stay informed, involved, and supported every step of the way.

TIPS FOR A SAFE AND COMFORTABLE STAY

- Check your hospital ID bracelet to make sure your name and birthdate are correct.
- Ask what each medication is before you take it. What is it? Why is it being given? Are there side effects?
- Speak up if something feels wrong, if you are in pain, or if a dose seems late or missed.
- If you don't understand something, ask your doctor or nurse to explain it again
 clearly and in plain language.
- Write down questions and updates in a notebook. A loved one can also help take notes for you.
- Ask when your doctor will visit, so you will not be asleep or if you want to have someone with you.
- Discuss routine tests with your doctor. You may be able to save money or a hospital day by having routine tests done prior to going to the hospital.

QUESTIONS TO ASK BEFORE YOU LEAVE

Can I have copies (paper or CDs) of all test results performed during my
stay? (Examples: radiology, lab results, etc.)
Can I have a list of my new or updated medications, including the dosage schedule?
When should I see my doctor after I leave, and can I have my follow-up appointments scheduled?
Do I need special paperwork for work or school?
Are there any activity restrictions or recovery tips I need to follow?
What are the warning signs to watch for (e.g., fever, swelling, pain, etc.)?
Do I have instructions for wound care or any equipment I need to use?
Who should I contact if I have questions after I'm home, and how can I reach my care team after hours?
